

Illinois Township Day Participation Tips

Greetings Fellow Townships:

The Illinois Township Association of Senior Citizen Services Committees (ITASCSC) has designated Wednesday, Sept. 21, 2016, "Illinois Township Day."

It's a day to educate residents and showcase to the community the services, programs and resources your township provides, such as youth and senior services, social services, assessor and highway department services, recreational activities and more.

As you are aware, townships are under state scrutiny as a result of recommendations made by the Local Government Consolidation and Unfunded Mandates Task Force. The passage of legislation related to township government could result in townships being abolished and/or consolidated. It is vital that we rally to increase public awareness of the valuable services townships provide, services that will likely cost taxpayers a great deal more if they left in the hands of a larger unit of government.

All townships are being asked to participate in Illinois Township Day by hosting an open house on Sept. 21. Invite residents to stop by your offices/departments to meet elected officials and staff, ask questions and collect information. This is a great opportunity to hand out your literature (brochures, resident guide, etc.) and inform residents of your many programs and services.

In addition to having an open house, consider a secondary activity or event to attract residents, such as a community blood drive, ice cream social or even a chili cook-off at your town hall. Make it a charitable event by encouraging attendees to bring donations of non-perishable food items for a local pantry or school supplies for those in need.

Share your plans for Illinois Township Day on social media. Create fliers to post around the community, including village halls, park districts, churches and local businesses. Create a graphic flier that can be published in electronic newsletters (yours and your community partners).

The following press release can be customized to include your township's specific plans for Illinois Township Day. Brag about your township's programs, services and resources. Let residents know why they should know you! Include testimonial statements from your supervisor and other elected officials about the value of the township. Post your press release on your website and social media and in your email and postal newsletter. Forward your press release to local newspapers. Some news websites also allow you to post press releases and events yourself, as a community contrib-

History of Townships

Historical Background

Township government, established in Providence, Rhode Island in 1636, is the oldest existing unit of government continuing to serve on the North American continent. Township government was in existence for 140 years prior to the signing of the Declaration of Independence in 1776. The wording of the Declaration of Independence reflects the fact that 38 of its 56 signers had experienced the benefits of township government.

The Declaration's statement that "government should derive its just powers from the consent of the governed" is demonstrated at the Annual Town Meeting held on the second Tuesday of each April. The Annual Town Meeting is still an important function of our nation's 17,000 townships after more than 360 years. The Illinois Constitution of 1848 gave voters in each county the opportunity to adopt Township Government. By 1850, the first township governments began operation. Today, 85 of Illinois 102 counties operate under the township form of government and the 1,431 townships serve more than 8 million citizens

Functions of Illinois Townships

By law, Illinois townships are charged with three basic functions: 1) general assistance for the indigent; 2) the assessment of real property for the basis of local taxation; and 3) maintenance of all roads and bridges outside federal, state, and other local jurisdiction.

Road and Bridge Maintenance

Township Government maintains over 71,000 miles of roads in Illinois - a full 53 percent of all thoroughfares in the state.

Property Assessment

Townships establish the value of all real property in the township. The township assessor, in fact, is the only elected governmental official who must pass approved courses of instruction before standing for election to office.


General Assistance

Townships provide food, shelter and emergency relief for needy people until they are able to support themselves. Many townships in Illinois operate food banks that guarantee the necessities of life for children.

Other Services

Beyond the three mandated services, Township Government provides other vital services to the people next door. This may include senior citizens programs, youth programs, assistance to the disabled, parks and recreational facilities, health services and cemetery maintenance. In this regard, township government serves its neighbors from the cradle to the grave.





1. Find a few key people to involve in the planning of your event.
2. People that know about your township services and/or use township services.
3. Ask if they would be willing to help put on a small event to inform other residents about what the township does.
4. Meet with the group to brainstorm on different ideas to bring people to the event:
 - Bake Sale
 - Yard or Trunk Sale (people selling goods out of their car trunks at your facility)
 - Music festival: local talent from the high school, community bands and other local people.
 - Car Wash
 - Pie judging contest...*(The possibilities are endless!)*
5. Divide tasks amongst the “troops”: i.e. press release/poster maker, food, logistics of the event, and a volunteer coordinator. *(this person should be an strong influence in the community who knows everyone and can place people in different activities).*
6. Follow our timeline for a successful event



Planning Timeline

- April 7:** Initial Team Meeting; gather troops and assign duties
- May 5:** Brainstorming session; bring in all support for a roundtable to discuss the progress
- June 4:** Planning session; Bring in willing bodies to commit to 4th of July promotion for residents to “save the date:”. Start looking for more recruits
- July 4:** Promotional Flyer to hand out a local parades to promote your township day
- August 4:** Meet with group. Circle back on preparedness for event. Troubleshoot issues
- September 1** Set up Social Media: 1. use press release for local media outlets 2. determine which contacts will personally invite to day; local papers, Facebook posting, flyers phone calls, and word of mouth
- September 10:** Group meeting: ensure all the details are covered: Promotional materials have been dispersed. Last minute push! Confirm any people who are participating /Performing at the event
- September 20:** Last minute follow up calls to team for support. Make sure they have shared the news.
- September 21:** The Big Day
- September 22:** Thank you notes, letters to the editor for a successful event
- September 30:** Post event meeting. Gather feedback and start to plan next year’s event!



How to Divide and Conquer

1) Form a small committee to formulate a plan for your township. This committee could include:

Community Members

Business Leaders

Scout Leaders

Volunteer Group Leaders

Township Supporters

2) Decide how big or small your Township Day will be

3) Play to people's strengths, you will be surprised the talents that lie within your volunteers

4) Make certain that every volunteer has a meaningful job
